

# Community Needs Assessment August 2017

## BRIEF SUMMARY

#### **Background**

In the fall of 2015, the United Way of York County partnered with Winthrop University's Department of Social Work to conduct a community needs assessment. The objectives of the needs assessment were:

- 1. To examine the areas of need in York County.
- 2. To explore the existence of social problems in York County.
- 3. To solicit recommendations from study participants on how to address the identified needs and problems.

This *Brief Summary* presents the methods and findings from the United Way of York County's 2015 Community Needs Assessment.

#### **Methods**

The community needs assessment collected primary data on the needs of York County residents. Data was collected through the dissemination of surveys and focus groups with identified population groups.

Surveys

Surveys were distributed electronically via email and hard copies were sent to community partners from September 1<sup>st</sup> to November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2015. Additionally, surveys were translated into Spanish to encourage greater participation from the Hispanic community. A total of 548 residents of York County completed surveys.

#### Focus Groups

Seven focus groups were conducted between August and November 2015. A total of 73 individuals attended the focus groups. Participants included service users, service providers, educators and parents, members of the Hispanic community, and community leaders. During the sessions participants were asked to discuss what they saw as the main issues related to the delivery of social services, poverty, unemployment, transportation, housing, and healthcare.

#### **Findings**

#### Survey Results

The following issues were identified as "high need" by respondents:

- 1. Good Paying Jobs (70%)
- 2. Affordable Child Care (59%)
- 3. Affordable Senior Care (56%)

- 4. Mental Health Care/Affordable Housing (52%)
- 5. Public Transportation (50%)

Respondents identified the following as "high need" for healthcare related services:

- 1. Mental Health Care (70%)
- 2. Teen Crisis Interventions (59%)
- 3. Health & Wellness Programs (56%)
- 4. Primary Health Care (52%)
- 5. Substance Abuse Treatment (52%)

In terms of problems in York County, respondents "strongly agreed" that the following issues represented a problem in their community:

- 1. Lack of Public Transportation (43%)
- 2. Lack of Affordable Housing (34%)
- 3. Poverty (34%)

- 4. Lack of Jobs (31%)
- 5. Illicit Drug Use (30%)

### Focus Groups

<u>Lack of transportation</u>. The lack of transportation was consistently echoed across focus group sessions, in particular, with service users and providers, educators, and the Hispanic community. Each focus group identified the lack of transportation as the central problem related to accessing health care and social services, employment, education, and housing.

<u>Lack of cultural and economic sensitivity.</u> Participants across all focus groups reported that

individuals seeking social services and public assistance were treated with disrespect and

stigmatized. Individuals from the Hispanic community were especially vocal in expressing the

lack of cultural sensitivity among social service providers.

Lack of affordable housing. Focus group participants reported a lack of affordable housing.

They noted that although many houses are being built in the Fort Mill and Rock Hill areas, these

houses were off limit due to the high cost to many low-income families. Similarly, participants

recognized the high costs of rentals.

Barriers to health care. Participants reported that rising costs, the lack of transportation, and

language difficulty presented major barriers to accessing quality health care.

<u>Lack of job opportunities.</u> Individuals noted a scarcity of jobs in the area. Furthermore, jobs that

are available do not pay a living wage.

<u>Disparities in education resources.</u> Participants expressed concern that educational resources

were not universally available across York County.

Conclusion

This community needs assessment has provided a better understanding of the issues and areas of

need in York County. The issues are varied and complex, impacting all residents of York

County. Fortunately, participants offered thoughtful recommendations for improving the

conditions which have guided the United Way of York County in tailoring its funding procedures

and implementing programmatic changes in order to meet the most pressing issues and needs in

York County.
