Bold Goal to help 3,000 York County families achieve financial stability by 2030

Our Collective Impact Agenda aligns all our work (internal programs, collective impact efforts, and partner grants) with our Bold Goal. **Power to Thrive** removes barriers to help low-to-moderate income families more easily access and navigate services to reach financial stability. An individual's path to self-sufficiency is often filled with obstacles that can slow or even prevent them from escaping poverty. We have a responsibility to focus our resources where the greatest impact can be made to eliminate the complex hurdles limiting families to simply surviving instead of truly thriving.



FINANCIAL STABILITY GRANTS

Such an effort requires not only collaboration but also an investment in deeper relationships with our strategic partners. High impact organizations can apply for our financial stability grants on an annual basis. We utilize the Results-Based Accountability framework to hold ourselves and our partners accountable to collective impact outcomes that move the needle on our community's challenges.



FINANCIAL STABILITY NETWORK

UWYC serves as the lead organization in convening partners to seamlessly connect families with organizations addressing common barriers to financial stability. This innovative approach relies on collaboration to provide case management and coaching to remove barriers and support families on a path to pursue their dreams of financial self-sufficiency.



FINANCIAL STABILITY ADVOCACY

United Way seeks to educate our community about the many barriers families face on their path to stability. We are in communication with local, state, and federal officials about policies and decisions that influence one's ability to be financially secure.



Results-Based Accountability

We utilize the Results-Based Accountability framework to hold ourselves and our partners accountable to collective impact outcomes that move the needle on our community's biggest challenges. We use this framework to ensure the dollars entrusted to us are invested in ways that will result in the greatest measurable impact.

Results-Based Accountability (RBA) uses data-driven decision making processes to help communities and organizations get beyond talking about problems to taking action to solve problems. It quantifies results, not just to measure, but to confirm a program's impact on the target area or population by asking three questions:

- 1) How much did we do?
- 2) How well did we do it?
- 3) Is anyone better off?



Grounded in Equity

In order to achieve our long-term impact goals, we cannot ignore the inequities that have kept people of color from experiencing the same opportunities as their white counterparts. Through the data, we see disparities between race categories even across socioeconomic levels, which exposes bigger issues outside of just income differences. We see the real disparities that exist in our community and acknowledge the years of systemic racial injustice that prevent certain groups of people in our community from thriving. For this reason, we have a responsibility and are committed to equity in our programming.



A family's path to self-sufficiency is often filled with obstacles that can slow or even prevent them escaping poverty. This path is even more difficult for families caught in the cycle of generational poverty. We have a responsibility to focus our resources where the greatest impact can be made to eliminate the complex hurdles limiting families to simply surviving instead of truly thriving.

According to the 2019 census data, nearly **40,000 families** in York County (52%) earn between 125 and 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level. Over 90% of these families have at least one worker, but they don't have the income to save for emergencies and don't qualify for typical assistance.

The top 4 fastest-growing occupations in York County pay a living wage, yet nearly 50% of all full-time workers earn less than \$50,000 per year.

UWYC helps low to moderate-income families who are struggling to meet monthly expenses due to a variety of factors including underemployment, a significant amount of debt, barriers to supportive services, high housing costs, poor money management, and/or lack of access to affordable banking products. UWYC helps these families easily access and navigate financial literacy and workforce development services to overcome barriers and achieve long term, sustainable, financial stability.



Financial Literacy

Bold Goal to help 3,000 York County families achieve financial stability by 2030

Families who have financial literacy skills are more likely to make wise financial choices. UWYC links families to financial products, education, and services to give them the financial tools and resources they need to meet their monthly expenses, save for the future, and plan their path to financial stability.



Workforce Development

Workforce Development services help individuals identify and access job trainings, vocational degree, or credential programs that help them to achieve their goals and gain employment with a livable wage

Economic & Family Support

Bold Goal to help 3,000 York County families achieve financial stability by 2030

Foundational to families achieving economic mobility is their ability to pay for basic needs--things like housing, food, utilities, childcare, and transportation. Every day, there are many families in our community on the verge of losing their homes or unable to purchase groceries. There must be a strong safety net of service providers in place to assist these families overcome barriers so they can move toward self-sufficiency.

INTENDED RESULTS



Connect individuals and families to support services that reduce barriers to achieve financial stability

2021-2022 SUCCESS

824 families received financial support for childcare or after school care to allow caretakers to attend workforce development or financial literacy training, school, or work.

Economic & Family Support Fund

UWYC's **Economic and Family Support Fund** provided emergency utility assistance to working families on the path to financial stability. Through partnerships with Housing Development Corporation of Rock Hill, Salvation Army, Fort Mill Care Center, and Eden Community Development Corporation,

In addition to our typical Financial Stability Partner Grants, UWYC provided two additional grant opportunities as part of our 2021-22 cycle.

Innovative Grants

These smaller one-time grants were made available to organizations doing work in the space of Financial Stability. Instead of being constrained to providing funding during our typical grant application period, this funding allowed UWYC to remain nimble and meet community needs throughout the year. UWYC invested \$55,000 in innovative grants to three organizations in York County: Rock Hill School's Challenger Program, Housing Development Corporation of Rock Hill, and Victory Gardens International.

Measurement Grants

\$7,800 in funds were allocated to two agencies to support community-level tracking and data sharing in York County: Bethel Shelters and the Black Economic Leadership League. This funding may be used for activities that may include, but are not limited to, software, subscriptions, or incentives for agencies to share data.

UNITED WAY'S CALL CENTER

SC 2-1-1 or 866-892-9211 connects people with important community services to meet everyday needs and the immediate needs of people in crisis.

SINGLECARE PRESCRIPTION DRUG DISCOUNT CARD

Free prescription discount card with no eligibility requirements. Discount cards are available at the UWYC office or at www.singlecare.com.

EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER PROGRAM

Federal grant administered through United Way of York County to help prevent homelessness. Local agencies are awarded funds to assist with rent, mortgage, and utilities.

LETTER CARRIERS' STAMP OUT HUNGER FOOD DRIVE

United Way partners with the National Letter Carriers' Association annually to collect food items placed at mailboxes by residents. Items are distributed to local food pantries that are in need of re-stocking their shelves during critical summer months.

VITA

Through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, volunteers become certified tax preparers and provide qualifying individuals and families with free, reliable assistance in filing state and federal returns.

INNOVATIVE STRATEGIES

MONEY WORKS FINANCIAL LITERACY PROGRAM

In partnership with The City of Rock Hill, United Way staff worked to develop a financial literacy program. Based on the FDIC's evidence-based curriculum, Money Smart, Money Works is a "choose your own path" program that allows clients to customize their experience based on their financial knowledge and skills, as well as their long-term goals. Each participant partners with a Money Works staff member to provide individual financial coaching and support.
